Why We Love to Boat

I love my boat. There, I've said it. My boat makes me happy. It's worth every penny my husband spends on it.

Whenever we can get out on the water, we go. I'm excited every time I see a dolphin, alligator, bald eagle, roseate spoonbill, turtle, or really, any critter. I recently spotted a cute little mink swimming like the dickens toward the shore in the Hampton River. It was great! Every trip is different. Every trip is fun.

We know instinctively that being by or on the

water makes us happier and reduces stress. Did you ever wonder why? In the book **Blue Mind:** The Surprising Science that Shows How Being Near, In, On, or Under Water Can Make You Happier, Healthier, More Connected, and Better at What You Do, author Wallace J. Nichols presents lots of scientific and anecdotal evidence of water's beneficial effect on us. According to Nichols, "the mere sight and sound of water promote wellness by lowering cortisol, increasing serotonin, and inducing relaxation."

I've often wondered why taking the same trip up and down the Hampton River or into Village Creek doesn't get boring. In **Blue Mind**, Nichols explains how nature, and water in particular can be both relaxing yet stimulating for the brain. Nichols writes, "In a natural environment, there is a high degree of statistical predictability because it is so much the same from moment to moment. The background is fairly controlled and a little dreamy...which allows part of the brain to relax. Against that background, the brain is continually looking for perturbation, for something that doesn't fit, something that moves, something that wasn't there before and that doesn't match with my representation of the landscape...When the brain sees a perturbation, it creates a sense of surprise and novelty." For me, looking for splashes, colors, or patterns I didn't expect (e.g., something moving on the bank), etc. is engaging and exciting. My brain really loves those moments.

We've been very busy lately with all sorts of commitments, trips, and appointments, so we haven't had much opportunity to get out on the water; only seven times in April – well below average. Then our depth sounder stopped working and the weather hasn't been good (is the wind ever going to die down?). Not only has my mood been suffering, but so has my tan.

Stuck in unbelievable traffic on Frederica Road the other day with my husband is not a recipe for calm and peace, but our moods did perk up when we heard this great song. We both loved it immediately. It's called **Buy Me a Boat** by Chris Janson. Some of you country music fans may know it (it was released in 2015), but for those who haven't heard it, here are some of the lyrics:

I ain't rich, but I damn sure wanna be
Workin' like a dog all day ain't workin' for me
I wish I had a rich uncle that'd kick the bucket
And I was sittin' on a pile like Warren Buffett

Club Education Officer Report



CEO Mike Moye,

The long-awaited Boat Handling course is off and running and things are going well. The first three of the six sections in the course have been completed plus a very interesting On-The-Water demonstration was held at Hampton Marina.

Jerry and Cynthia Lamb volunteered their boat and arranged for a very experienced marina employee to show us some docking tricks he has learned after having docked hundreds of boats at the marina over the years. If you're looking for a good tutor to help with your skills, Garret Carlson, our instructor for the demonstrations was super. He has very recently left Hampton and is now working with the Freedom Boat Club where I'm sure he will be helping new members there with their boating skills.

Folks say that you can't teach an old dog new tricks, but even the saltiest of skippers could learn some things from Garret. During the Boat Handling course, we talk about how coming into a dock can be one of the most intimidating experiences a new boater can face. He ex-

pressed that same sentiment. The solution he shared and one that I often tell folks is practice, practice, practice. Find a dock on a "not busy" day and experience first-hand how your boat reacts against stiff wind and strong current. Especially take note of the controls and how much thrust is achieved in forward and reverse when "bumping" in and out of gear. That always becomes a major factor when going with or against current and wind. He had a bit of a smile when he admonished us to "learn where neutral is on the controls." No one wants to crash into another boat or into a dock but if you see that is going to happen the gears need to be in neutral—not in forward at 4000 rpm with you in panic mode.

Garret explained to us that when you move lots of boats in and out of slips every day, without assistance, that you really learn some line handling tricks that make the job easier and much safer. It's just a matter of planning ahead and having appropriate lines ready to quickly attach. Know the current. Know the wind. Know how the boat will react when you put it in gear. Know that happy hour will be much happier when you have a successful and non-eventful docking experience.

Upcoming Cruises (May - August)

In order to give people more time to plan, I've laid out cruise ideas for the next 4 months. I'm always looking for inputs and ideas on cruises you all would like to take.

May Cruise:

Our next cruise will be on Saturday, May 21. We will journey up the Mackay River to the South Altamaha for lunch at Mud Cat Charlie's. Mud Cats has indoor and outdoor seating. Our itinerary is as follows:

WHEN: Saturday, May 21

WHERE: Meet in Manhead Sound at the entrance to the Mackay River at noon.

ROUTE: Go north on the Mackay River to the South Altamaha River to Mudcat Charlie's at Two Way Fish Camp. Follow same route to return or explore the Frederica River (east off the Mackay; the entrance is between Day Beacons 228 and 229) on your way home. GPX files of the route will be provided.

WHAT TO BRING: Lunch money, bug spray, drinks, suntan lotion.

BOAT RULES: Maintain contact via VHF channel 72, max speed 20 mph in the Mackay, 15 mph in the South Altamaha.

HOW TO SIGN UP: Reply to Cynthia Lamb by text (860-908-5148) or email (Cynthia.l.lamb48@gmail.com) by Wednesday, May 18. Let me know if you are bringing your boat or need a ride. All are welcome!

Commander Jerry and I will review the weather forecast on Friday afternoon. If we determine that it is <u>not</u> safe to proceed, you will be notified.

June Cruise:

I know we said earlier that the June 18 fishing trip with Captain Brooks out of the Hampton River Marina would constitute both our social and cruise for June, but we thought it would be fun to have a "pop-up" cruise for lunch at Zachry's Riverhouse Restaurant on Jekyll Island. We are a boating club, right? We need to cruise!

This will be a weekday cruise. The plan is for Friday, June 24. Details will be forthcoming as we get closer to the date.

July Cruise:

I'm very excited about this cruise It was Ed Reynolds' suggestion: picnic lunch cruise to Plum Orchard Plantation on Cumberland Island. The Plum Orchard dock is the northern most public dock available on Cumberland Island. It is run by the National Park Service. It is a small dock, and boats are welcome to park where they find space. It is a short walk along the road to the Plum Orchard Mansion. This is a great entry point to access some of the trails that wind through the designated wilderness area on the island.

The entry fee is \$10 per person. If you have the Golden Passport national parks pass, the fee is waived for yourself and up to 3 riders.

The date for this cruise will be either July 16 or the 23rd. I'd like inputs from our cruisers on which date works best for them, so we can get this one planned soon.

August Cruise:

This involves a cruise up the Hampton River and anchoring for an on-boat picnic. We will meet at Manhead Sound at the beginning of the Mackay River, then go north on the Mackay River until we reach the Hampton River entrance. We will follow the Hampton River up close to Pelican Spit, where we will anchor close together to picnic and socialize!

The date for this cruise will be either August 13 or the 20th. Again, I'd like inputs from our cruisers on which date works best for them, so we can get this one planned as well.
