








The Squadron Education Report Audie Holmes, JN

Cdr. Charles Wilsdorf, SN, called the meeting to order 22 August 2009 at 7:00 PM. Howard Klippel, S, provided the invocation, XO Larry Jefferis, AP, led the Pledge of Allegiance. Charles introduced Past Commander/National Staff Commander

Coast Guard Tour: We were finally able to get the tour of Coast Guard Station Brunswick arranged for 29 August. Charles Wilsdorf, SN, Joe Scirica, S, Linda Mahoney, S, Vicky Jefferis, AP, and Larry Jefferis, AP, were guided through the facility by FN (Fireman) Jesse Robb, a fine young "Coastie" who was knowledgeable of the day-

to-day workings of the station, their equipment and their vessels. It was an enjoyable tour and very informative.

Coast Fest: We're still looking for volunteers and a project leader for Coast Fest on the 3rd of October. Please confirm your participation with me ASAP we can coordinate our efforts.

Squadron Cruise: Vicky and I have started preparing ODYSSEY for the September cruise to Fernandina. We hope to see many more of you there. Even if you don't "boat in" let Jack Sterrett or myself know that you'd like to join us for dinner on Friday and/or Saturday evenings.

Texas Talisman Dance: A couple of weeks ago, August 19-21 to be exact, there occurred an event in the Saint Simon's Channel, which was extraordinary to me. The channel dredge "Texas" was delivered to our area by the "Talisman", the mother ship, to be employed to improve the shipping channels around Jacksonville. There were several extraordinary aspects of this operation which I'd like to share with you. The "Texas" had most recently been used in the country of Bahrain and had been brought here by the "Talisman". The loading/unloading process is extremely difficult due to the sheer size of the "cargo", the close proximity of the two gigantic vessels floating so dangerously close to each other, and the possible effects of tidal current on the operation.

The "Talisman" is a converted oil tanker. The configuration now, after extensive modification, reminds me of the 18 wheeler "low boys" that carry excavators or earth movers over the highway. The "Talisman" has a huge bow, a huge stern section, a very tall bridge, and then two very tall bulkheads on either end of a very long deck which appears to

be about 24 feet above water level. It's like they've taken a knife, made two vertical cuts at either end of a large center section then filleted the center off the lower part of the hull ... a very ingenious creation to move a massive piece of equipment. The "Texas" is then carried in this "notch" in the "Talisman's" hull.

A very detailed examination of the south eastern coast was made to select this particular spot for its depth. I understand that this operation had been executed some 18 months ago in the vicinity of St Marys but that previously used location wasn't available this time. The "Talisman" normally draws about 50 feet. That's pretty constant in that the hold is partially flooded to maintain ballast when the "Texas" is not aboard. In order to load the "Texas" on her deck, "Talisman" must "sink" and allow "Texas" to float onto or off of the "Talisman" deck. This is done by flooding the hold of the "Talisman" which causes her draw nearly 90 feet when flooded.

Besides the "Texas" there were other barges, long sections of pipe and large floats aboard that had to be removed first before the "Texas" could be released. These had to be removed after the "Talisman" was "sunk" and before the "Texas" could be moved. It takes about 14 hours to "sink" the "Talisman" to the point where her cargo deck was awash.

Additionally, in order to control the "Talisman" and to minimize the effects of the tidal current, they could only remove "Texas" and the other barges on the deck safely when the current was below 2 knots. At each current shift (change from rising to falling tide or vice versa) the "Talisman" had to be shifted to a "bow into the current" position. This resembled a "spin" move with tugs pushing "Talisman" stern and bow simultaneously in a carefully orchestrated maneuver. I overheard the tugs conversation on a hand held VHF radio and it was amazing. I also understand there were daily coordination meetings before and after any maneuvering was attempted. There were, at peak activity periods, as many as 8 tugs around the "Talisman" in order to keep her in position and to pull/push the "Texas" off her deck. From the air it must have looked like a huge ballet.

After "Texas" was floated off "Talisman's" deck, it was towed by tug to Jacksonville. I was able to see the maneuvering that occurred to get "Texas" properly oriented, get the tugs disconnected and...

repositioned for the run to Jacksonville. The whole event seemed to take forever (three days) but once "Texas" was floating and safely away from "Talisman" everything seemed to happen very quickly. The suspense which had hovered over the entire scene was gone. The crowds disappeared and life returned to normal.



It was a spellbinding scene even though it resembled watching paint dry at times. The last day, the day "Texas" was removed was most interesting because of the viewing angles. The tugs on the far (south) side of "Texas" were obscured.
