Don't be Fooled When Documenting Your Vessel!







Which is the real vessel documentation agency?

Many boat owners choose to document their vessels with the U.S. Coast Guard in addition to registering in their state. Documentation is a federal form of registration that is recognized internationally. It provides conclusive evidence of nationality, while its "Certificate of Documentation" also serves as a title for the vessel.

The ONLY source for documentation is the U.S. Coast Guard. Unfortunately, many other commercial entities advertise with similar logos, markings and color schemes, INTENTIONALLY luring unsuspecting owners to register using their services. Their service is legal, but they are a third-party charging an unnecessary fee, sometimes up to several hundred dollars.

Don't be duped into using an unnecessary middle man when the Coast Guard's National Vessel Documentation Center (NVDC) makes it easy and cheap to keep your vessel properly documented. For more info: http://www.uscg.mil/nvdc/

Coast Guard Documentation - Fast Facts

To qualify, a vessel must measure at least five net tons and must be owned by a citizen of the U.S. When a vessel is documented as recreational, it may not be used for any other purpose. The vessel's document must be shown to state law enforcement personnel upon their demand; therefore, your original document must be stored onboard. Georgia requires documented vessels to be registered according to Georgia regulations (but without hull numbering) and to display the decal showing that they have complied with state requirements.

Are you a History Buff?

To get to know your vessel better, it is often possible to trace its history through the entire chain of ownership by the endorsements that appear on the documents. The first certificate for a particular vessel often cites the most information: builder, carpenter, or surveyor. Plus, the reverse side of many certificates contains endorsements of surrender or the fate of the vessel. If you own a vessel with any age on her, you may appreciate knowing her whole story.

U.S. Vessel Registration Began with Early Colonists

Vessel Documentation is one of the oldest functions of U.S. Government. Laws were put forth under George Washington by the First Congress in 1789. Taxes on vessel tonnage, registering and clearing vessels in the ports of the New World show the importance of marine trade and transportation in establishing the new society. Registration was initially limited only to citizens.

Borrowing the Capital One TV commercial's theme of "What's in your wallet?", my question to all is "What's on your book shelf?". Specifically, I'm thinking what's lurking there that might have a nautical related title? These days, our book shelves might be virtual and include electronic files that contain books, blogs, and electronic messages like *The Porthole*. Many of us joined America's Boating Club, The United States Power Squadron to take advantage of opportunities for Boating Education. We have some great courses and we've all learned a lot, but how do we keep that information fresh? How do we add to it? How do we pass it on to others—our fellow boaters, our friends who want to be boaters, and most importantly to our children? So, I thought it might be a good thing to pass on some of the things I read and view to keep up with trends and to learn new things. This is how I try to continue my education about boating. It's part of my quest for "Life Long Learning"—something we must do as we age just to stay sharp at the helm.

First, the magazines—There are tons of different magazines that are crafted to meet your individual interests. For years I subscribed to Wooden Boat, mainly because I owned a wooden boat. I don't have that boat or subscription any more but still pick up copies off magazine racks—it's always a great read. Likewise, I pick up Good Old Boat to get ideas. Obviously, that's a magazine about older boats—specifically sail boats, but if you must maintain your boat—large or small, you'll find great ideas and techniques. A buddy of mine once got me a free subscription to Power and Motor Yacht. I've been enjoying it for twenty-five years, always beautiful photography and stories about boats I may never see let alone be able to afford but it's fun to dream. I've subscribed to Boating and Saltwater Sportsman for a while, but those sister publications move in a different direction than my current boating focus. I love Yachting and have really enjoyed the tech articles and "how to" articles found there. I even have two WWII era copies of Yachting that were fun to read to see how they did it "way back". My go-to magazine these days is Soundings. It's tailored for boaters in the northeast but has information that all boaters can use. Since I'm a Boat U.S. member, I get their magazine as well as our own Ensign. Great reads, but of course the slant is mostly related to organizational happenings.

Blogs and e-newsletters are among my favorite sources of boating information these days. I get multiple reading doses each week from lots of different sources. Some are devoted to sailing, some power, some trawlers, and one of the best is devoted to living aboard. That one is called *The Boat Galley* and is written by Carolyn Shearlock. She writes a little about the galley and what goes on there (cooking) but mostly it's about boat projects—almost anything you can think of that can be done by a DIY boater. A couple of the other blog/newsletters that I follow are devoted to maintenance. They are both powerboat oriented—specifically trawlers. One is *Trawlers and Trawlering* and the other is *Trawler Forum*. They both have search engines and I promise, if something has needed repair/maintenance it has been discussed by these folks. I read them so much that I feel like I know the contributors personally.

I think big ships are cool. I read the *gCaptain* newsletter almost daily. It gives the news of the shipping world so many articles are not of interest, but lots are. *Cruising Compass* is a newsletter devoted to sailing. It has a sister newsletter devoted to power boating called *Cruising Odyssey*. Both cover a wide variety of topics and are great reading even if you're not a cruiser. All of the electronic resources mentioned are free and delivered directly to your email box. Just Google the title and they'll tell you how to subscribe. I suggest sampling first.

I had every intention of mentioning a few of my favorite books, especially those to which I often refer. Many of them contain boating lessons that are best reviewed many times. I'll try to sneak them into a future *Porthole*.

The April ABC class will be over when this is published but thanks to all who played a part in making it as successful as I know it will be.

District 26 2019 Spring Conference

The D/26 Spring Conference, hosted by Long Bay Power Squadron, was held March 8 – 10 at the Crown Reef Beach Resort in Myrtle Beach, SC. Golden Isles' members, CDR Charles Wilsdorf, SN-ON, Lt/C Teresa Wilsdorf, S and P/C Vicky Jefferis, JN attended.

Over one hundred members from South Carolina and Coastal Georgia participated in the event. D/26 Commander Jim Wilkins and the D/26 Bridge worked closely with the host squadron to provide attendees with seminars and workshops that were interesting and beneficial to everyone, not just squadron Bridge members. The seminars that received the most participation were the Active Shooter presentation, the Coop Charting On-the Water Exercise, the Geodetic Survey Exercise and Introduction to Squadron Activities Reporting System (SARS). Both the Coop Charting and Geodetic Survey Exercises provided participants an opportunity to experience a hands-on outing and then learn how to record the findings in the updated USPS reporting system. The SARS seminar was also a hands-on experience. System creator Al Lehman introduced this new tool especially developed to help the squadrons keep track of information used for various USPS reports and to develop narratives needed to recommend members for Merit Marks each year. He demonstrated how the system works and spent time with each squadron representative attending.

At the Conference business meeting, CDR Wilsdorf had the opportunity to invite everyone to the May 17-19 Cruise & Rendezvous and talk about Golden Isles' plans for our weekend of fun on the water and in the Golden Isles area. Judging from the comments and questions Charles received, many people are interested in attending and enjoying our area from the water.

The Spring Conference is traditionally the time when annual awards are presented to squadrons and individuals. This year Golden Isles was recognized with the 2018 Distinctive Communicator Award for both *The Porthole* and our website and for finishing 11th nationally in Coop Charting activity.



Safety Alert 13-18

Let us enlighten you about LED lighting! Potential interference of VHF-FM Radio and AIS Reception.

The U.S. Coast Guard has received reports from crews, ship owners, inspectors and other mariners regarding poor reception on VHF frequencies used for radiotelephone, digital selective calling (DSC) and automatic identification systems (AIS) when in the vicinity of light emitting diode (LED) lighting on-board ships (e.g., navigation lights, searchlights and floodlights, interior and exterior lights, adornment).

Radio frequency interference caused by these LED lamps was found to create potential safety hazards. For example, the maritime rescue coordination center in one port was unable to contact a ship involved in a traffic separation scheme incident by VHF radio. That ship also experienced very poor AIS reception. Other ships in different ports have experienced degradation of the VHF receivers, including AIS, caused by their LED navigation lights. LED lighting installed near VHF antennas has also shown to compound the reception.

Strong radio interference from LED sources may not be immediately evident to maritime radio users. Nonetheless, it may be possible to test for the presence of LED interference by

using the following procedures:

- 1. Turn off LED light (s).
- 2. Tune the VHF radio to a quiet channel (e.g. Ch. 13).
- Adjust the VHF radio's squelch control until the radio outputs audio noise.
- 4. Re-adjust the VHF radio's squelch control until the audio noise is quiet, only slightly above the noise threshold.
- 5. Turn on the LED light (s).
 - If the radio now outputs audio noise, then the LED lights have raised the noise floor. (Noise floor is generally the amount of interfering signals / static received beyond the specific signal or channel being monitored.)
- 6. If the radio does not output audio noise, then the LED lights have not raised the noise floor.

If the noise floor is found to have been raised, then it is likely that both shipboard VHF marine radio and AIS reception are being degraded by LED lighting.





In order to determine the full impact of this interference, the Coast Guard **requests** those experiencing this problem to report their experiences to <u>Coast Guard Navigation Center</u>¹. Select "Maritime Telecommunications" on the subject drop down list, then briefly describe the make and model of LED lighting and radios effected, distance from lighting to antennas and radios effected, and any other information that may help understand the scope of the problem.


