Commander's Message

Our club's newsletter, the *Porthole*, has once again been awarded the **Distinctive Communicator**Award for 2020. The award recognizes those publications and websites

that meet or exceed the defined award criteria by America's Boating Club National Communications Committee. Even though our *Porthole* has earned this distinction since 2008, it was completely reformatted with a new look when our editor, Cathy Stortz, AP took the reins in 2018. Our newsletter has received high praise from our members, other clubs, the district and the national organization. Thank you, Cathy and all of our contributors, for your dedication and hard work to bring us a fantastic and informative newsletter each month. Please keep up the good work.

And, our club's website gisps.org has once again been awarded the **Distinctive Communicator Award for 2020.** We also have received this award since Sharon Hindery, AP took the helm.
Our club owes Sharon much appreciation for her skill, work, and dedication to our website.

We, as well as all boaters, have lost an important service. Sea Tow nationally, which had over 130 locations with the automated "Radio Check" has ceased this service. My information is that Sea Tow leased the equipment and service through a large national communications company who did not meet up to their end of the contract possibly leaving Sea Tow in a bad situation. Again, it is a loss of a great boater service.

You should use one of the non-commercial channels (68, 69, 71 or 72) for radio checks. Using channel

16 for a radio check is in violation of FCC regulations. Make sure you listen first before keying the mic so that you don't walk on someone else's communication. It is a good idea to prearrange with another boater a time to make the radio check. Radio checks should also, at least initially, be transmitted on low power (1-watt) by calling "radio check" three times ending with your boat name and location. You want someone on the other end to answer with "loud and clear". Please let Michael Moye, SN, our club's Education Officer, know if you are interested in a marine communications seminar.

America Magic is the sailboat that literally flies. See: Onboard America Magic and As seen from a chase boat. If you haven't watched this class of America Cup boats race, give it a try, you will be amazed.

National and District virtual meetings are both on the near horizon. The date for the annual America's Boating Club meeting is February 15th - 26th. For details see: Member's Home Page on the USPS website. You will need your USPS certificate number and your password or pin number. I suggest you download the pdf meeting schedule to identify the subjects that might interest you. This is a great way to get first-hand USPS national level information with no travel and it is free.

District 26 will hold a virtual 2020 Awards presentation Friday, March 12th and a virtual Training Workshop March 13th. There is also a tentative plan for a District 26 Cruise and Rendezvous sponsored by the Beaufort and Hilton Head clubs with a theme of "Explore the Low Country like the Conquistadors of the 16th Century" April 21st - 25th. There will be more detailed information to follow.

Now, there is one other subject I would like to broach briefly. I am sure you recognize that our present club bridge officers have been serving for a long time. The precedence in our club has been an annual Change of Watch (COW) in November releasing the present bridge and installing a new one. For the past several years we have recycled the same members over and over. This recycling is not only unfair to members who serve, but it also sty-

Explore Gray's Reef!



Gray's Reef National Marine Sanctuary is Georgia's amazing underwater park. The natural live-bottom reef is teeming with marine life and is part of the endangered North Atlantic right whale's only known calving ground. Loggerhead turtles, a threatened species, forage and rest at the reef, where scientists have identified more than 200 fish species. The 22 square-mile sanctuary is the only protected natural reef and one of a few natural marine protected areas in the Atlantic Ocean between Cape Hatteras, North Carolina and Cape Canaveral, Florida.

Club Education Officer Report

The first ABC class of 2021 is scheduled for February 6. The numbers of folks signing up looks light at this point. I wish I could blame it on COVID, but frankly we've had some mighty small classes back when folks were not worried about the virus. After the February class the next ABC class is April 3. Large or small, we put everything we have into making our classes top quality. A great example of this is the experimental Marine Navigation class being taught by Commander Charles. He is doing a great job teaching a subject that would be difficult to present even in a face-to-face situation. His version is entirely on Zoom which makes it triple hard on the instructor. In addition to preparing and fine-tuning student manuals and Power-Point presentations, he also had to master presenting on Zoom. This has taken hours and hours (days and days) of behind the scenes work to master this new instructional technique.

Writing this, I'm sitting in front of a nice cozy fire and enjoying a drizzly and chilly afternoon. Hurricanes were the last thing on my mind—until I heard a guy on the tv mumble something about La Niña. You see, I know a tiny bit about La Niña (the little girl). Back in 2013, members Coy Hodges and Charles Wilsdorf taught the USPS Weather course. It was quite inter-

esting, but very difficult. Parts of it were even downright scary too. We learned about some funky stuff like Gustnados and Dust Devils, but also some pretty cool things like the Green Flash and Rainbows. Everything about the course was important, but the thing that really caught my attention was the section on hurricanes and the factors that influence them. That's where La Niña enters the picture.

Now, if you lived in Buffalo and watched tv up there, you would have caught the part of the discussion about how La Niña will drastically impact the winter pattern in the northern states. But, if you live in the south and happened to hear Glenn Burns, the chief meteorologist for WSB in Atlanta, you would have heard him painting an entirely different picture. We don't worry so much about snow but do have definite concerns about things that influence the severe spring tornado occurrences. If you're a boater (like Glenn), especially if you have a larger boat at a marina, hurricane season keeps you on the edge for a predictable/unpredictable six months.

In the Weather course we learned that La Niña is a naturally occurring ocean-to-atmosphere phenomenon where we see much cooler than average sea surface temperatures around the equator in the eastern Pacific. The opposite is El Niño (the little boy) where warmer than average sea temperatures are seen in that region of the world. One of these patterns can hold for a couple of years or more before slipping into the other. It's interesting how the relatively small change in the ocean's temperature can affect the weather all over the world.

As boaters we really must watch the dramatic effects that come during La Niña. Like last year, the little girl could again lead to more tropical cyclones. Remember the record breaking 30 named storms in 2020 with 12 of them hitting our shores (and boats) in the U.S?

Let's all hope La Niña decides to take a nap in 2021.

Great Ocean Story - Historic Moment in 1899

The passenger steamer SS Warrimoo was quietly knifing its way through the waters of the mid-Pacific on its way from Vancouver to Australia.

The navigator had just finished working out a star fix and brought Captain John DS. Phillips, the result. The Warrimoo's position was LAT 0° 31' N and LONG 179 30' W. The date was 31 December 1899. "Know what this means?" First Mate Payton broke in, "We're only a few miles from the intersection of the Equator and the International Date Line". Captain Phillips was prankish enough to take full advantage of the opportunity for achieving the navigational freak of a lifetime. He called his navigators to the bridge to check & double check the ship's position. He changed course slightly so as to bear directly on his mark. Then he adjusted the engine speed. The calm weather & clear night worked in his favor. At mid-night the SS Warrimoo lay on the Equator at exactly the point where it crossed the International Date Line! The consequences of this bizarre position were many:

The forward part (bow) of the ship was in the Southern Hemisphere & in the middle of summer.

The rear (stern) was in the Northern Hemisphere & in the middle of winter.


The date in the aft part of the ship was 31 December 1899.

In the bow (forward) part it was I January 1900.

This ship was therefore not only in:


Two different days, Two different months, Two different years, Two different seasons,
