
Greetings everyone! This may be a bit techie for some for a newsletter, but so many people have asked about the boat refurbishment project that I might as well share it here. A few pictures will tell the story.

The main project since August has been refinishing teak trim on the exterior. If anyone has been through a similar effort, I'm sure you'll agree that comparing notes with others has been the most critical factor in success so far. It's been fun - selecting teak wood for replacements, sealant/caulks, epoxy choices along with varnish and how different materials adhere or don't - and the UV, water and adhesion properties of everything . . . that should explain in shorthand the whole story of where I've been spending my time.

So from here the end is in sight for Phase I - topsides teak and trim. Phase 2 will be rail replacement (8' stretch on the beam), and Phase 3 is toe and rub rails.

Dial in for the monthly Club Social Tuesday the 19th - a rare opportunity to learn about nuclear subs! And I am hoping to see everyone for the best turnout ever at the Change of Watch Banquet on November 5th! - Terry





# **Club Education Officer Report**

We notified the club in last month's *Porthole* that our October 9 ABC class is cancelled due to pandemic considerations. In addition, we are going to hold off on setting a date for Boat Handling. On a very positive note, the Weather Seminar completed last week was a delight. A couple of folks attending had taken the longer Weather class and this proved to be a great review of that information. For those who had not taken a weather-related course before it was a great introduction to what is undoubtably one of the more complex aspects of boating. Knowing the weather issues that are lurking "out there" is extremely important. There are so many variables affecting our daily weather that it is difficult to comprehend them all. But boating is "all about the weather." If we want to enjoy the **good days** on the water, we have to be aware of those that might turn into **bad days**. The next time the weather course comes around give it strong consideration.

I've promised several folks that I would share some photos of our recent trip from St. Petersburg to Jekyll. The very first leg of the trip was a planned trip on June 9 to a boat yard in Cortez which is on the intracoastal outside of Bradenton. That was my first turn at the helm of Sharona, Too and I was happy to have the assistance of an experienced captain for that twenty-mile trip. What was not planned was a two and a half month visit at the boat yard. The big hold up was sourcing parts on some delayed maintenance items that had to be replaced. In fact, a couple of items couldn't be purchased and had to be

fabricated by local shops. Fortunately, the Tampa Bay area has many, many boat related businesses so it was not difficult finding someone who could do the work—we just had to get in line.

We had watched with great interest as a couple of hurricanes skirted the Tampa Bay area. The first was Elsa in early July that finally hit land in Taylor County, Florida. The second was Fred a storm that passed further out to sea and came ashore in mid-August at Cape San Blas. The one that got us though was Ida. Ida was a scary storm that hit Port Fourchon in Louisiana as a category 4 hurricane on August 29 with sustained winds of 150 mph and gusts beyond 170 mph. We left Cortez on August 28 knowing that Ida was in the gulf. However, she was probably a couple of hundred miles from us and clearly headed northwest toward Louisiana. What we didn't count on was the width of the storm and the intensity of the outermost bands.

A little past Sarasota about halfway to our marina destination in Venice clouds began to form and we knew it was about to rain. No worries—we have a good enclosure and I had just replaced the windshield wipers. Driving a car in the rain is something we do all the time—just slow down and be careful. However, when you're in a very narrow intracoastal channel and the summer shower you were anticipating is a band from a very strong hurricane, it's a different story. The winds were fierce, the rain was blowing sideways, and it moved us in directions we sure didn't want to go. I developed very quickly a great appreciation for airplane pilots who fly by instruments. All I had to rely on to stay in the I50 ft. wide channel was my chart plotter and depth sounder. I did some maneuvering that turned out to not be the best thing I could have done and ended up churning mud outside of the channel. In fact, one side dug in so deep that it killed one of the engines. I was able to fire it up again quickly and with the help of bow and stern thrusters got out of what could have been an even bigger mess. Every now and then we could catch a glimpse of a red aid to navigation marker and one of the ever present "watch for manatees" signs. One of my biggest worries was in the blinding rain, hitting one of those telephone poles holding the signs and markers. Well, the storm left as quickly as it arrived, and we continued on toward Venice like nothing had ever happened (and no, I didn't have to change my shorts).

We chose not to anchor during the trip staying in marinas along the way. The towns we visited after St. Petersburg and Cortez were: Venice, Punta Gorda, Fort Myers, Clewiston, Stuart, Fort Pierce, Melbourne, Titusville, Daytona, St. Augustine, Fernandina, and home to Jekyll Island. Best I could tell, the trip was about 450 miles. We kept our speed around ten knots running at I 500 rpms. We don't have a fuel/speed/rpm chart developed yet but I believe that I'm getting about one mile per gallon at that speed. Our Carver Voyager Pilothouse 530 has a five foot hydraulic extension that takes the boat to 58 feet. The engines are twin Cummins 6CTA 8.3/450 h.p. each. At planing speed I7-18 kts., we would burn around 30 gallons per hour. I don't plane off very often...

On the following three pages are some random photos and comments. Even with multiple cameras on board we were a little pre-occupied on the trip, so we didn't have any award winning shots, but you'll get the feel for what was a (mostly) very enjoyable trip. Sharona, Too, now resides in our same old slip at Jekyll Harbor Marina. She feels right at home in the Golden Isles.



Sharona, Too docked in St. Petersburg eager for the trip to her new home.





You just can't get in a big hurry traveling the intracoastal. We found ourselves passing slower boats only to end up waiting at a bridge or lock for a lock through or opening.



And so we asked the Lock Master "how far do we drop?"

"Just a little," he answered.

Well, fifteen minutes later the water was still rushing out of the lock. We learned later that the drop was an astounding 14 feet. When you look at the walls and gates you can't help thinking about all the tons of water the tiny gates are holding back. Later that evening we were talking to another boater who had recently done the Great Loop. She said that Okeechobee is nothing. In Kentucky, they dropped 95 feet in one lock.



Sharon is not just smiling at the camera. She's smiling because we're casting off for the final leg of our trip. Before the sun sets we would be in Jekyll Island.






